To God Be the Glory

Hymnologist William J. Reynolds, writing in his hymnal companion Hymns of Faith (1964), documented the return of this hymn to the USA: "It is most extraordinary that this long-forgotten American gospel song should have been imported from England and become immensely popular during the last decade."

Frances Jane Crosby's hymns have historically been among the most popular songs sung by Methodists. Crosby (1820-1915), who became blind as an infant, was a lifelong Methodist.

This hymn begins with the Great Commission (Mt 28:19-20). The poet then proceeds to offer those who sing this hymn a response to the words of Christ at the end of the Gospel of Matthew. In stanza one, “fervent prayer” leads to the transformation of our lives—lives that should reflect Christ “everywhere.”

The Rev. Carlton R. Young, UM Hymnal editor, provides the context for this hymn: “The hymn was first sung at the commissioning of teachers and church school officials during Christian Education Week, 1955, at University Methodist Church, Syracuse, where the author was pastor.

Pour out your Holy Spirit on us gathered here,
and on these gifts of bread and wine.
Make them be for us the body and blood of Christ
that we, together as a new creation
and a new community around the globe
may be for the world the body of Christ,
redeemed by his blood.

By your Spirit help the body of Christ be one.

Bring the blessing of the diversity of the body to bear fruit

Close to Thee

Fanny Crosby
(1820-1915), one of the
most famous American
hymn writers of her time,
often composed hymns
texts to previously
composed music. For
example, Crosby
immediately was inspired
by Phoebe Palmer
Knapp's (1839-1908)
tune for the hymn that
became "Blessed
Assurance" (The United
Methodist Hymnal, No.
369).

According to her book,
Memories of Eighty Years
(1906), Crosby had a
similar experience when
Silas Jones Vail brought
the poet one of his new
melodies: "Toward the
close of a day in 1874 I
was sitting in my room
thinking of the nearness
of God through Christ as
the constant companion
of my pilgrim journey,
when my heart burst out
with the words."
